Welcome to Worship!

This morning, we continue in our Advent theme of "Come, Lord Jesus!"

When Jesus comes back as judge, everyone will face one of two outcomes: either they will be judged righteous and experience the peace and joy of heaven, or they will be judged wicked and suffer unquenchable fire. Such judgment is inevitable. How do we prepare for that day, for seeing Christ's second coming with joy rather than fear? By listening to the words of John the Baptist, who pointed to the One who serves both as judge and Savior. For those who fail to repent, the second coming of Jesus brings certain doom. But for us, for those who have faith in Christ, we see his coming as Judge like a banner on the hilltop, rallying us to his glorious side.

It is our hope and prayer that the message you hear today from God's Word will fill your heart with the peace that only God can offer and the joy we have in knowing that Jesus Christ is our Savior from sin.

Lord's Supper



a glory you do give me, a treasure safe on high,

God, our heavenly Father, has been merciful to us and has given his only Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son + and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Lighting of the Advent Wreath

We light two Advent candles and remember Jesus, the One who came in history. He came into a world of sin and death as the promised Messiah.

We hear his call to repent.

We light two Advent candles as a sign of our repentance and desire for renewal.

Come, Lord Jesus, and dwell among us.

Through your Word and Spirit may our souls be blessed.

The Advent candles are lit during the sung response.

They will neither harm nor destroy on all my holy mountain,



Second Reading Romans 15:4–13

Because God has raised up the Root of Jesse as our Savior, God's people face the coming judgment not with fear but with hope.

For everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through the endurance taught in the Scriptures and the encouragement they provide we might have hope.

May the God who gives endurance and encouragement give you the same attitude of mind toward each other that Christ Jesus had, so that with one mind and one voice you may glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God. For I tell you that Christ has become a servant of the Jews on behalf of God's truth, so that the promises made to the patriarchs might be confirmed and, moreover, that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written:

"Therefore I will praise you among the Gentiles; I will sing the praises of your name."

Again, it says,

"Rejoice, you Gentiles, with his people."

And again,

"Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles; let all the peoples extol him."

And again, Isaiah says,

"The Root of Jesse will spring up, one who will arise to rule over the nations; in him the Gentiles will hope."

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Gospel Matthew 3:1–12⁺

God sent John the Baptist, a voice in the wilderness calling for repentance, to prepare us for the coming judgment.

In those days John the Baptist came, preaching in the wilderness of Judea and saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is he who was spoken of through the prophet Isaiah:

"A voice of one calling in the wilderness,

'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him.' "

John's clothes were made of camel's hair, and he had a leather belt around his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey. People went out to him from Jerusalem and all Judea and the whole region of the Jordan. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River.

[†]Matthew: The author of the first Gospel is Matthew the apostle, a tax collector who answered Jesus' call to follow him. Matthew was likely written to Greek-speaking Jews. He emphasizes Jesus as the fulfiller of Old Testament prophecy. The genealogy at the beginning of his book traces Jesus' ancestry back to Abraham, thus establishing Jesus as a legitimate heir of David. Although Matthew was likely writing to Jewish readers, he also emphasizes the universality of God's grace. This can be seen in the inclusion of four women in his genealogy of Jesus, the recounting of the visit by the Magi (Gentiles), and the extending of the Great Commission to all nations.

But when he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to where he was baptizing, he said to them: "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce fruit in keeping with repentance. And do not think you can say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' I tell you that out of these stones God can raise up children for Abraham. The ax is already at the root of the trees, and every tree that does not produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire.

"I baptize you with water for repentance. But after me comes one who is more powerful than I, whose sandals I am not worthy to carry. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor, gathering his wheat into the barn and burning up the chaff with unquenchable fire."
